Pilot Programme for AYA Patients - 'The Hangout'

- 'The Hangout' is a pilot programme for Adolescent and Young Adult (AYA) cancer patients (16-24 years)
- 'The Hangout' is a result of a partnership between the clinical academic programme at TSJCI and the Guinness Enterprise Centre (GEC). The GEC is a centre of innovation in the local community in Dublin 8, adjacent to St James's hospital
- The aim of 'The Hangout' is to provide access to multi-professional healthcare teams in a non-clinical environment while partnering with business and innovation at the GEC
- · Coordinated by the AYA nursing team and attended by the multi-disciplinary teams







Pilot Programme for AYA Patients - 'The Hangout'

Pilot Results

- Eight sessions have been held to date.
- Eight AYAs at various stages of their cancer trajectory have attended.
- Attendees note that they are "listened to", enjoy "making the plans together", and can "relax".
- Some attendees also report greater optimism for plans and achievements in vocational and educational goals.
- The aim that this initiative will become permanent, and will grow to include the National AYA cancer network which consists of designated sites at University Hospital Galway, Cork University Hospital, St James's hospital and Children's Health Ireland @ Crumlin.

- Optimise cross disciplinary and cross institution nurse communications between medical, surgical, radiation oncology and adolescence and young adult (AYA) nurses.








Fundamentals in Cancer Surgery

- NMBI accredited
- 4 day course
- Open to internal/external cancer surgery nurses and medical oncology/haematology nurses
- Run twice a year

Hematopoietic Stem-Cell Transplantation Pathway for Haematology Nurses

- Three step educational pathway
- Currently in development aiming to launch Q3 2023
- Blended learning approach: online/self-directed learning, simulation, and clinical practice.









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
